Re: Winchester Dam Removal

Dear Winchester Water Control District board and membership:

We the undersigned organizations are writing to you because we have become aware that WaterWatch of Oregon, in an effort to end ongoing harm to fisheries and water quality in the North Umpqua River, approached the Winchester Water Control District board of directors in February with a proposal to enter into a voluntary agreement to remove Winchester Dam at little to no direct cost to the District. We wish to inform you that we wholeheartedly support this proposal. In addition, we all stand ready to work together to help acquire the state, federal, and private funds necessary to achieve a successful dam removal under such a voluntary agreement, which we believe is the most ecologically and economically viable alternative for addressing the multitude of chronic problems at this structure.

As you know, Winchester Dam on the North Umpqua River is among the state's highest priorities for improving fish passage. Dating back to the turn of the previous century, this obsolete and deteriorating structure provides no flood control, hydropower, or water supply function, but significantly harms salmon, steelhead, and water quality in one of Oregon's most famed and valuable rivers.

Protecting and restoring the North Umpqua River is vital to increasing wild steelhead and salmon abundance in the Umpqua Basin. The North Umpqua's important cool water and spawning and rearing habitat for salmon and steelhead has been the focus of decades of intense locally-driven protection and restoration efforts.

Dam removals, such as the many dam removals in the Rogue Basin, have been shown by scientists at Oregon State University and the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife to

provide multiple public benefits, including restoration of valuable salmon and steelhead populations. We believe Winchester Dam removal will increase salmon spawning success and juvenile salmon survival by improving access to large areas of high quality protected upstream habitat. We also believe that its removal will expand recreational opportunity and enhance public safety in the lower North Umpqua.

As a general rule, our organizations support collaboration between dam owners, public agencies, and non-profit organizations to actively and substantively work towards improving fish passage, improving public safety, and ending harm to fisheries and water quality. We are hopeful this can occur here, and urge you to reach a voluntary agreement for dam removal with WaterWatch that will facilitate such an approach. We are convinced that this agreement would benefit all who value and depend upon the spectacular North Umpqua River.
